Critter Creek Farm Sanctuary's mission is to promote compassion for farmed animals through rescue and outreach.

Our Vision

We envision a world in which animal cruelty is a thing of the distant past. We won't stop giving a voice to the voiceless until this vision comes to fruition.

Our History

Founded in 2016 by Dr. Erin Amerman and Dr. Chris Amerman, in three short years CCFS grew to become the largest bovine sanctuary in the United States. CCFS has two facilities totaling 415 acres that house 211 rescued animal residents and a wildlife refuge. With our evergrowing social media accounts, frequent media features, and popular monthly "Farmers Mookets," CCFS reaches thousands of people per month with our message of compassion.



A message from our President

Mo was born prematurely one cold evening.

In 2021, CCFS took in a herd of 40 severely neglected cows from Sunrise, Florida. Upon their arrival, we learned that 10 of the 40 cows were pregnant. Our 40-cow rescue instantly became a 50-cow rescue.

One unseasonably cold evening in November of 2021, Chris and I did an evening baby check. We didn't usually do evening checks, but it was by far the coldest night of the year, so we figured it was better to be safe. As we drove out into the field, we caught sight of Celeste, one of the pregnant cows. Next to her was what looked to be a very large cow patty. But then, the cow patty moved. What first appeared to be an exceptionally large cow patty turned out to be an exceptionally small baby. Celeste wasn't due until January. This meant something was very wrong.

At that point, I had to do the most heartbreaking thing I've done since starting the sanctuary: I had to take Celeste's baby away from her. Celeste is an older cow, and she has likely lost many babies to human hands. I will never forget the look of utter defeat and betrayal on her face as I drove away with her tiny baby.

The baby was in rough shape. He was about two months premature, he couldn't stand on his own, and his initial temperature was so low the thermometer couldn't register it. But we sensed that he had a fighting spirit, so we named him Muhammad Ali, or Mo for short.

Mo's name proved to be prophetic, because he was indeed a fighter. By day 2, he was able to stand. By day 3, he took his first steps. Within a week, he was back with Celeste. By February of 2022, they were both strong enough to rejoin the Sunrise herd.

Because of your support, Mo received the care he needed. And in 2022, he is happy, growing, and thriving.

Being born in a sanctuary setting and having access to immediate, specialized care saved Mo's life. And that care was made possible by you. We are so thankful for each and every one of you who made Mo's success story--and countless other such stories possible. Thank you, truly.



Outreach Highlight: Farmers Moo-kets Continue to Grow

Seven Farmers Moo-kets brought over 4000 guests to the sanctuary.

Critter Creek's Farmers Moo-kets have become a local phenomenon! Our Mookets average 700-1200 guests from around the state. Guests come to enjoy time with the animals, plant-based foods from 15+ vegan food vendors, and products from local artists and craftspeople. Our October Moo-ket surpassed 1500 guests and our parking lot overflowed for the first time!


